

Progress Lodge No 4584 EC

In March, a small deputation of Provincial Grand Lodge Members travelled south to the Wirral, near Liverpool, to attend a very interesting Centenary Celebration Meeting of Progress Lodge No 4584, in the Province of Cheshire. Progress Lodge is the Mother Lodge of Bro Simon Regan, who is a popular visitor to many of the Lodges in our Province.

We were made very welcome and joined the assembled Brethren to witness an interesting Centenary Celebration led by RW Bro David Dyson, the Provincial Grand Master of the Province of Cheshire accompanied by a very large deputation of Provincial Grand Lodge Office-bearers.

An excellent harmony followed, with many very informative speakers contributing to a very entertaining evening.

The visit was particularly interesting as the meeting was held in Port Sunlight, a village that was built by Lever Brothers, to house families of those employed in their Sunlight Soap factory. William Lever saw Freemasonry as a useful tool to promote social cohesion and high standards of personal conduct and actively encouraged membership amongst his workforce. He established a Masonic network at Port Sunlight which deliberately reinforced the existing hierarchy within Lever Brothers. Separate Lodges were created for managers, supervisors, and workers.

Bro. Lever was a founding member of Progress Lodge No. 4584, and it was reputed that the name "Progress" originates from the title of the mid managers internal newsletter called "Progress".

In May 1918, now known as Lord Leverhulme, he purchased the Isle of Lewis for $\pounds 167,000$ and in late 1919 he also bought the estate of South Harris for $\pounds 36,000$.

In December 1918, the brethren of Lodge Fortrose No. 108 unanimously elected him to be their next Master of the Lodge and he was installed to chair on 17th January 1919.

So, it was quite fitting that we were visiting a lodge in England founded by a Past Master of the Province of Ross and Cromarty.

Prostate Scotland


As a Prostate Champion, I was pleased to present the first Prostate Awareness Presentation at Lodge Averon No.866, which appeared to be well received by the brethren present.

The role of Prostate Champion was set up as part of the legacy partnership between the Grand Lodge of Scotland and Prostate Scotland. The Prostate Champions role is to raise awareness about the prostate, make people aware of prostate disease and prostate cancer, tell them about the signs and symptoms to look out for and let them know where to get help and support. It is particularly relevant to men over fifty years of age, as prostate disease will affect almost 1 in 2 men, and 1 in 10 men are at risk from prostate cancer.

Some Interesting and Strange Masonic Trivia – received from Bro Bomi Mehta, PDGM, India

On August 23, 1879, Lodge #239 of France held a meeting in a balloon flying over Paris, at which time a candidate was initiated.

On his famous solo flight across the Atlantic, Charles Lindbergh wore a square and compasses on his jacket as a good luck piece. He was a mason.

When the great Obelisk of Alexandria (Cleopatra's Needle) was moved to New York in 1880, there were discovered certain emblems on the original foundation and pedestal. One is clearly a square, causing some to conclude that Masonry existed in ancient Egypt. This issue is still open to debate.

The largest Master's chair is in Ophir Lodge #33 Murphy's, CA. It is 15 feet long and can seat the Master, living Past Masters, and visiting dignitaries.

In 1892, the tallest building in the world was the Masonic Temple at Randolph and State Streets, Chicago, IL

Brother William Brockmeier (1866-1947) of St. Louis conducted 5586 Masonic funeral services.

Happily, these brethren are still with us, simply enjoying their Masonic retirement at home after more than a hundred years in Freemasonry collectively. The good news from Kyle is that we now have three new Brethren of younger years join the Lodge. The last going through his First Degree in May. They bring with them new ideas that will benefit our Membership and make for a more interesting experience when our brethren attend the Lodge.

One of the newer ideas (from PM Bro Rob Wilson) is our *What's App Group*. We encouraged all brethren to install the App and one of the first benefits is the immediacy of response from almost all members of our What's App group. For example: One Brother sent me (The Secretary) an open Apology as he was unable to attend the Meeting that week. This was closely followed by three more apologies in rapid succession. While it's not good that 4 Brethren were unable to attend, it indicates that the others in the group WILL be attending, thus the knowledge that the Meeting will go ahead and not need to be cancelled. Some of our number have reasonably long distances to travel, and it is somewhat disheartening to travel all that way in the dark, wind and rain, only to be told the Meeting has been cancelled.

The What's App group is only for Kyle Brethren as too many members would ruin the efficiency of the experience. I believe it to be an excellent addition to any Lodge's Marketing and Communication Working Tools.

If you would like to form a WhatsApp group for your Lodge – it's easy! This is what you do: -PREP: Choose someone in the Lodge with phone and app skills, we will call him Admin. He is responsible for adding Members and the tasks that require intervention (like telling people what they can and can't do). He will then explain to the brethren the advantages of a WhatsApp Group and that it is secure. He will then instruct the brethren how to install the What's App or offer help if a phone is being problematical. Once everyone is "installed", a brief training session can be held to show the brethren where the most frequent actions and buttons are. This is by far the hardest part of setting up the Group.

Setting up the Group:

Open WhatsApp and go to the Chats tab. Tap on the "New chat" icon (it looks like a speech bubble with a pencil). Select "New group" from the options. Now you can choose the participants for your group. Search for or select the contacts you want to add and tap on their names.

Once you've added everyone you want, tap the green forward arrow.

Give your group a relevant or catchy name! This will be the subject of the group chat. You can also add an emoji for some personality.

You can set a group icon by tapping the camera icon. You can choose an existing photo or take a new one.

When you're happy with everything, tap the green checkmark icon to create the group. That's it! Your WhatsApp group is now set up. You can start chatting with everyone you added.

Here are some additional things to keep in mind:

There's currently a limit of 256 people you can add to a single What's App group.

You can also invite people to a group after it's created by sharing a link or QR code.

There is a desktop version of the App for PCs and Mac.

BITS AND PIECES

Following a recent sojourn by a deputation from the Provincial Grand Lodge of Ross and Cromarty to the Wirral to attend a Centenary Celebration Meeting at Progress Lodge No.4584 EC, we were made aware of the huge impact that Williams Hesketh Lever had made in Freemasonry in that area and it was particularly interesting as he was a Past Master of Lodge Fortrose No. 108 in our own Province.

William Hesketh Lever

William Hesketh Lever, 1st Viscount Leverhulme FRGS FRIBA, (19 September 1851 – 7 May 1925) was an English industrialist, philanthropist, and politician. Having been educated at a small private school until the age of nine, then at church schools until he was fifteen; a somewhat privileged education for that time, he started work at his father's wholesale grocery business in Bolton. Following an apprenticeship and a series of appointments in the family business, which he successfully expanded, he began manufacturing Sunlight Soap at a factory in Warrington, building a substantial business empire with many well-known brands such as Lux and Lifebuoy. In 1886, together with his brother, James, he established Lever Brothers, which was one of the first companies to manufacture soap from vegetable oils, and which is now part of the British multinational Unilever.

The success of the Sunlight brand, especially after Lever assumed full responsibility for the product's quality, was exceptional; so much so that by the end of 1887 it had become impossible to squeeze any more capacity from the Warrington plant. Having failed to either extend the site or find more space in the areas, Lever eventually decided to move the whole manufacturing facility to an 11 acres (4.5 ha) green-field site near Birkenhead.

Port Sunlight

Lever was the founder of 'Port Sunlight'. In 1887, Lever bought 56 acres (23 ha) of land on the Wirral in Cheshire between the River Mersey and the railway line at Bebington. This site became Port Sunlight

where he built his works and a model village to house its employees. From 1888, Port Sunlight village offered decent living conditions in the belief that good housing would ensure a healthy and happy workforce. The community was designed to house and support the workers. Life in Port Sunlight included intrusive rules and implied mandatory participation in activities. The tied cottages meant that a worker losing his or her job could be almost simultaneously evicted.

In some matters, Lever was keen to allow the residents of Port Sunlight a degree of democratic control, and this seems to have led to a common conviction that he was in favour of women's suffrage: a belief that possibly stems from a situation arising in



connection the Bridge Inn, a Port Sunlight temperance "pub" that was opened in 1900. Lever was a lifelong teetotaller, and he naturally assumed that the Bridge would be "dry". Within two years of its opening, however, representations were made to change its status to a licensed house. Lever promptly announced that he would not impose his own views, and that the issue would be decided by a referendum; insisting somewhat unconventionally for that time that women would take part. With the added proviso that the Bridge would only become a true British "pub" if a supermajority of 75% was in favour, Lever probably felt confident that the outcome would support his abstemious sentiments, but in the event more than 80% voted for an alcohol licence and even though some people petitioned Lever urging him to use his absolute authority in Port Sunlight and ignore the referendum, he refused to do

Port Sunlight is the location of Hulme Hall, named after Lever's wife's family name, where Progress Lodge No. 4584 meet, and where we met for the Centenary Celebration Meeting.

Port Sunlight which has around 900 homes and many historic buildings and parks, remains preserved as a model village and has been informally suggested as a World Heritage Site.

Freemasonry

William Hesketh Lever became a freemason when he was initiated into the lodge named after him, William Hesketh Lever Lodge No. 2916, in 1902. He passed through all the chairs and was installed as Master in 1907. The lodge was formed by a group of local masons, many of whom worked for Lever Brothers and chose to have their named after the chairman of the company. It is possibly unique in being one of the few lodges to be named after a living non-mason.

The warrant was signed on the 18th of April 1902 and the Lodge was consecrated on Wednesday 4th June 1902.

William Hesketh Lever was installed as Worshipful Master of the Lodge on the 25th of October 1907 at the regular Installation Meeting held Girl's Institute, Port Sunlight.

In 1907, while sitting as an MP, he was a founder of the Phoenix Lodge 3236, and in May 1912 he founded St. Hilary Lodge No. 3591. He then became Past Pro-Grand Warden (P.P.G.W) and Immediate Past Master (I.P.M). In 1919, he was appointed Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of England. He was Provincial Senior Grand Warden of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Cheshire and founded many other Lodges.

Brother Lever saw freemasonry as a useful tool to promote social cohesion and high standards of personal conduct and actively encouraged membership amongst his workforces. He established a Masonic network at Port Sunlight which deliberately reinforced the existing hierarchy within Lever Brothers. Separate Lodges were created for managers, supervisors, and workers. Freemasonry was an important instrument in his paternalistic policy for the welfare of his workers.

In May 1918, by then in semi-retirement, Baron Leverhulme of Bolton-le-Moors, as he was then known, bought the Isle of Lewis for £167,000 (probably the equivalent of £16 million today). And in late 1919 he bought the estate of South Harris for £36,000; both of these located in the Outer Hebrides, Scotland.

The Brethren of Lodge Fortrose No. 108, in Stornoway, Isle of Lewis, one of twelve Lodges in the Province of Ross and Cromarty, were very honoured and delighted to have Lord Leverhulme affiliate to the Lodge on 23rd August 1918. Later that same year, on the 27th of December 1918 the Brethren saw fit to elect him as Master of the Lodge, and Lodge Fortrose Secretary's telegram to Lord Leverhulme read; "Pleased to announce that your Lordship was unanimously elected RWM of Lodge Fortrose No. 108, Stornoway at forenoon meeting today. Festival of St John tonight - glad to receive message for Brethren assembled."

Lord Leverhulme's reply was "Grateful thanks for telegram just received and for supreme mark of confidence in myself shown by Officers and Brethren unanimously electing me Worshipful Master Lodge Fortrose for coming year which I am honoured and pleased to accept relying with fullest confidence and support and forbearance of Brethren in my sincere and best endeavours to discharge the duties and heavy responsibilities of this high office. Allow me to convey to one and all best wishes of the Season and a happy and prosperous year for Masonry in Lewis - Leverhulme."

On 17th January 1919 he was installed into the Chair of the Lodge as Right Worshipful Master of Lodge Fortrose No. 108.

He only held office for one year, declining the honour of a second. He was presented with his Past master's jewel by the Master Bro. George Stewart on the 18th of August 1921.

This is his certifcate confirming that Brother The Right Honorable William Hesketh Lever, Baron Leverhulme, *as admitted to the Degree of an Installed Master ts the Right Worshipful Master of Lodge Fortrose, Stornoway No.108.



This certifcate dated March 14th 1919, confirming his enrolment as a Life Member of the lodge was issued to him during his year as master. Interestingly it is signed by him twice; once on the first pillar as the recipient, and again at the bottom as Master !

Progress Lodge No. 4584

It was an invitation from Progress Lodge No. 4584, the Mother Lodge of Bro Simon Regan, P Prov. G S of W, that introduced us to the life and career of William Hesketh Lever.

Lever was a founder and appointed as the first Immediate Past Master of Progress Lodge which is a daughter lodge of the William Hesketh Lever Lodge No. 2916.

The petition to form the lodge was signed on the 22nd of February 1923 and it was consecrated at 2.15pm on 23rd February 1924 in the Lady Lever art Gallery in Port Sunlight.



The name "Progress" appears on the original badge of the Lodge and was also the name of a Lever Brother's internal business magazine. Former employees of Lever Brothers verify that that his magazine is still in print. The Red Rose of Lancashire was a direct of two founder members, Bro's. Charles Lancashire and Walter Lancashire, the Anchor and "Busy Bees" reflect the local Boys Brigade from which many of the founder members had been involved with.

Western Isles

In May 1918, by then in semi-retirement, Baron Leverhulme, as he was now, bought the Isle of Lewis for £167,000 (equivalent to £16,700,000 in 2021), and in late 1919 he bought the estate of South Harris for £36,000; both in the Outer Hebrides, Scotland. His plans for their future prosperity centred upon the application of modern science and his own business skills in establishing a large and thriving fishing industry. Although Stornoway had a good harbour, there were many disadvantages to Lord Leverhulme's plans for the port. Its remoteness led to additional transport costs for ice, fuel, packaging, and anything else that had to be imported, as well as for the fish products, almost all of which was sold on the Scottish mainland. The place itself was, for various reasons, unpopular with sailors, and the local population's strict Presbyterian observance of the Sabbath had a negative effect on fishing operations, while catches of varieties of fish other than herring were unfeasibly small.

Lord Leverhulme intended that the port should be improved and enlarged to attract landings of fish from visiting vessels to supplement catches made by local boats and his own fleet of modern drifters and trawlers. There would be an ice-making factory, and cargo vessels with refrigerated holds to take the fresh fish to a depot on the British mainland at Fleetwood, Lancashire, which was well placed to serve the industrial towns of the North of England. Leverhulme also expanded the herring-curing capacity and enlarged the fish processing facilities with the installation of a canning factory, and a plant to make fishcakes, fishpaste, glue, animal feed, and fertiliser, with similar equipment being established at Fleetwood.

Vertical Integration was apparently one of Leverhulme's main strategies for the island fisheries venture, and to this end he acquired retail fishmonger's shops in most of the UK's larger towns and cities: all were modernised and refitted, and their previous proprietors were installed as managers. This aspect of Lever's Hebridean venture was named Mac Fisheries; the fleet of fishing vessels the MacLine Company. Mac Fisheries was a success, and it grew rapidly until there were over four hundred shops all purchasing fish from many different wholesale suppliers. Other food industry enterprises were acquired including Wall's, a manufacturer of ice-cream and sausages, and various companies specialising in different segments of the fish business, as well as several fishing fleet owners and operators. Although these developments brought tangible benefits to the people of Lewis, Leverhulme's plans did not suit everyone, and this anomaly created severe obstacles for his ambitious plans for the Western Isles.

The population of Harris was smaller in size and more scattered than that of Lewis. Consequently, Leverhulme's plans advanced there with very few problems. With permission from the locals, the fishing village of Obbe was renamed Leverburgh. On 3 September 1923, Viscount Leverhulme, as he had become the previous year, addressed the Stornoway Council and the Lewis District Council at a meeting which he had asked to be specially convened on that date. Lord Leverhulme asked them to take the land and make their system work, but only Stornoway, always on Leverhulme's side, accepted the gift, set up the Trust, and to a large extent made it work for the benefit of the town. Left with so much of the Island he no longer wanted, Leverhulme sold off as much as he could, but many of the buyers were interested principally in shooting and fishing. Leverhulme died in May 1925. Very soon thereafter, the Board of Lever Brothers gave orders for all development on Harris to stop, and so Leverhulme's scheme for the Western Isles perished with almost nothing achieved there.
